

On Internationa Literacy Day in 2006, then-UN Secretary General Kofi Annan described literacy as "a tool that enables people to take advantage of new learning opportunities, respond to changing occupational demands, undertake greater responsibilities, build their way out of poverty and pro-

the lowest literacy rate worldwide (58.6%). This year, our chapter will continue its involvement with Better World Books by collecting reading material for Africa, a continent that is home to three countries with the lowest literacy rates in the world—Burkina Faso (12.8%), Niger (14.4%), and Mali (19%). A bin for collecting material is currently set up in the atrium of the Student Learning Center. Donations of books of any shape, size, and genre will be processed by a non-profit organization called Books for Africa, which has collected over 13 million books for 26 African countries since 1988. A mere 100 books can fund the shipment of 400 books, enough to provide for one classroom in Africa; and just 250 books will bring 1,000 books to Africa, enough for an entire school library.

The United States has a per capita GDP that is more than 33 times that of the West African nation of Burkina Faso. Yet even in the richest country in the world, illiteracy is still a major concern. The Na-
